- Family living for disabled or elderly adults who can no longer safely live alone
- Eligibility: Any adult who is disabled or elderly and needs assistance in order to live in the community. When admitted to the program, clients must be continent, motivated, and oriented to time and place.
- Adult Foster Care is funded by Medicaid.
 Caregiver families are reimbursed monthly for room, board and personal services
- Call for more information, to become a participant, provide a caregiver home, refer someone to the program.


